


OUR VISION

2025 FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


Breakdown of Expenses

Total expenses: \$481,428




Breakdown of Income

Made for More:

Down Syndrome and Human Flourishing A Reflection for Community, Families, and Supporters

Down syndrome is often misunderstood. For decades, it has been described mainly in terms of limitations—what individuals may struggle with, what they may never do, or what support they may always need. While medical and developmental realities are real, this narrow focus misses a far greater truth.

Individuals with Down syndrome are Made for More.

They are made for connection, creativity, contribution, leadership, and growth. Research, lived experience, and community practice consistently show that when individuals with Down syndrome are surrounded by supportive relationships and meaningful opportunities, they flourish. The role of families, organizations, and communities is not to lower expectations, but to build environments where potential can grow.

RETHINKING DOWN SYNDROME

Modern research has moved away from viewing disability only as a medical problem. Instead, it recognizes that many challenges faced by people with Down syndrome

come from social barriers—low expectations, limited access, and exclusion—rather than from the diagnosis itself.

Studies show that individuals with Down syndrome often report high levels of happiness, strong family bonds, and positive self-identity, especially when they are included in community life. This invites an important shift in perspective: people with Down syndrome should not be defined by what they lack, but by who they are and what they can become.

WHAT DOES “MADE FOR MORE” MEAN?

Being Made for More reflects the following core elements that shape long-term well-being for all people:

BELONGING AND RELATIONSHIP

Belonging is foundational. Individuals with Down syndrome thrive when they are known, welcomed, and valued as active participants in community life. Inclusive environments foster emotional health, confidence, and authentic friendships.

EXPRESSION AND COMMUNICATION

Communication is more than spoken words. Many individuals with Down syndrome flourish when given multiple ways to express themselves. Music, theater, visual art, movement, and storytelling provide powerful outlets for creativity, emotion, and identity, strengthening both confidence and social connection.

PURPOSE AND CONTRIBUTION

Every person needs to know they matter. Meaningful contribution—through work, service, performance, or responsibility—builds independence, pride, and purpose. When individuals with Down syndrome are given opportunities to contribute, they grow as capable and valued members of their communities.

AGENCY AND LEADERSHIP

Agency—the ability to make choices and influence one’s environment—is a strong predictor of positive adult outcomes. When individuals with Down syndrome are invited to lead, perform,

and help shape programs, they grow in confidence while challenging outdated assumptions.

LIFELONG GROWTH.

Growth does not stop in childhood. With sustained opportunities, individuals with Down syndrome continue learning and developing throughout adolescence and adulthood. Programs that support the whole person enable lifelong progress.

TURNING VISION INTO PRACTICE

Friends of Club 21 designs its programs around the belief that individuals with Down syndrome are Made for More. Rather than offering isolated services, FOC21 builds an integrated ecosystem that supports individuals and families across seasons of life.

Arts-based programs provide powerful tools for

communication, creativity, confidence, and leadership. Community events and gatherings create spaces of belonging where relationships grow and families connect.

Family engagement and support strengthen the broader relational network that makes long-term flourishing possible. Each program is designed not just to meet a need, but to unlock potential.

CHANGING THE NARRATIVE

The Made for More vision reaches beyond any single organization. It calls communities, schools, churches, and policymakers to rethink what inclusion truly means.

Inclusion is not simply being present—it is being valued, heard, and needed. When individuals with Down syndrome are seen creating art, performing on stage,

serving others, and shaping culture, public perception begins to shift. The story changes from limitation to possibility, from charity to partnership.

Down syndrome does not limit a person’s worth or potential. Individuals with Down syndrome are made for belonging, expression, purpose, leadership, and lifelong growth.

When communities design programs that honor these truths, people flourish—not despite Down syndrome, but as whole and valuable members of the human family.

This is the heart of Made for More: seeing what is possible, building environments that support growth, and celebrating lives full of meaning, joy, and contribution.

Aiden's Story: Finding His Voice Through Art


At 17, Aiden Listak has tried many activities—baseball, soccer, skiing, snowboarding—but nothing ever captured his heart like art. From a young age, he gravitated toward color, paper, and markers. He loves bold hues, clean lines, and the feel of a fresh-tipped Crayola marker. Precision matters to him. So does expression.

Today, Aiden attends a local high school, where his creativity shines in ceramics. After school, the family dining room becomes his studio. With music in his earbuds, he fills journal after journal with abstract geometric designs layered with vibrant color. When he was younger, he loved drawing rainbows—always in full spectrum. That joy has never faded.

At Friends of Club 21, we believe one of the most powerful ways to connect is through the arts. Across cultures and histories, the arts have become a universal language—one that fosters empathy, understanding, and belonging. For Aiden, Arts Academy is where that language comes alive. It gives him a way to express his perspective, his joy, and his story.

The Arts Academy continued to flourish as the creative heartbeat of Friends of Club 21, serving children, teens, and adults through music, drama, dance, and visual arts. These programs provide more than instruction—they offer vital pathways for communication, confidence, leadership, and self-expression.

This creative momentum culminated in the largest *Christmas This Year* production in organizational history, featuring four sold-out performances and supported by more than one hundred volunteers. Each performance celebrated not only talent, but purpose and contribution.

Creative visibility extended beyond the stage as Friends of Club 21 earned the grand prize for Best Overall Entry at the Monument 4th of July parade. These moments reminded our community that our performers are made of more than talent alone—they are made of resilience, joy, leadership, and the courage to be fully seen.
